Your pathway to NAIT

We offer admissions pathways for Aboriginal applicants to help you pursue your education goals and aspirations at NAIT. Review your program page on **nait.ca** for details on competitive requirements or the interview process to apply.

Competitive entrance programs pathway

Aboriginal applicants who meet the minimum entrance requirements for a competitive program but have not met the program's competitive entrance requirements will be considered for direct admission according to the date your application was completed.

Admissions interview programs pathway

For programs with an interview requirement, Aboriginal applicants who meet the minimum entrance requirements do not need to participate in a program interview or meet the competitive academic average required for high school courses. Instead, applicants will be invited by the program to share their personal story with a small NAIT committee, which includes an Aboriginal community member from NAIT. Your story can be provided as a written or oral submission as Aboriginal people have always been storytellers through oral traditions.

Tuition deposit

Aboriginal applicants are not required to provide a tuition deposit. Instead, after receiving an offer of admission, a seat in your program will be secured for you.
